She has now completed her probationary period, and we are excited to welcome her to full-time employment on staff for Local 406. We look forward to working with her for vears to come.

The New Orleans area has been busy with turnarounds as you will see reading Miguel's article. He has put in a tremendous number of hours on the clock and after hours also, working to find and supply qualified manpower to our contractors in the area. I have utilized our International, at his request, to ask for assistance in getting members from other locals to help fill the needs here as the manpower is being utilized and drained in multiple states across the South Atlantic Region. A special thanks goes out to our Regional Director Martin Patterson and Regional Representative Mitch Byrd for the assistance they provided in securing the manpower needs for all districts here.

Lake Charles has also been busy as the turnaround season came in as scheduled. The office has been busy processing manpower and getting operators out to the contractors as well as securing our vital documents into our cloud storage in case of another natural disaster. These efforts are to protect your financial records and personal information from being destroyed in case of a hurricane or fire. Turnarounds keeping us busy

Work in the Southwest Louisiana District is booming at this point



with Deep South having three turnarounds ongoing at the same time: Phillips 66; Westlake South; and Citgo. We have been able to supply manpower to all three turnarounds with local people, as well as travelers to supply the needs of our contractors.

One of the turnarounds was postponed until January 2025, which is at Westlake Petro-Chem and should precede our spring turnaround season. ME&I is working on a package for Air Products and should begin construction on modules after the first of the year. That job should employ a handful of operators and could possibly be a steady job for at least a year.

Along with manning the turnarounds, I have been working with Business Manager Jason Billings and our hiring committee to find the right fit for our Main Office in Metairie as the workload continues to expand there.

The spring turnaround season looks to be busy with outages at Westlake PetroChem and Phillips 66. If you know anyone that is interested in working the spring turnaround season, please advise them that they need TWIC and Safety Council for these outages. If you are interested in working any of these and do not have small and large hydraulic certifications on your CCO, now is the time to get them.

Fall outages begin

Currently, our fall outages are going strong with



Deep South, Maxim and Turner Crane and Rigging. Our 406 members as well as travelers are manning jobs at Valero in Meraux, Marathon Oil in Garyville, Shell in Norco, Chalmette Refinery and Bayer -Monsanto.

As always, please ensure that all required credentials are current and being able to pass DISA screens with some background checks. The outages should finish up in early November. I do encourage anyone that may finish early to call the district office and get on the out of work list. This will enable us to keep our out-of-work lists current and find additional work opportunities for you.

In conjunction with the Southeast Louisiana Building Construction and Trades Council, we secured a project labor agreement with Omega Foundation Services for the West Shore Lake Pontchartrain Levee Project in New Orleans. This is a Army Corp of Engineers project which is anticipated to begin in January, 2025. They will need excavators, dozers, loaders, skid steers and pile driving crane operators.

We are preparing to enter into contract negotiations with Deep South Crane & Rigging, Coastal Crane Services and Stateline Crane at the end of

October. We will provide updates on this process as it moves forward.

Remember, our Semi-Annual Union Meeting will be held on Saturday, November 2, 2024 at our Baton Rouge Office. Please make every effort to attend. I want to thank the members for all their hard work and dedication in manning our work and would like to wish everyone a happy and safe holiday season and a prosperous New Year.

Apprenticeship Program Updates

Sisters. We are
three quarters of
the way through



2024, and it's been a busy and productive year for our apprenticeship program. I'm excited to share some updates with you and highlight the hard work and progress of our apprentices.

Apprenticeship Status Update

We currently have a total of 60 apprentices in the program, of which 37 are actively working with our signatory contractors, gaining valuable hands-on experience. The apprentices are employed as follows: IUOE Local 406 Apprenticeship: 1, Boh Brothers: 12, Deep South: 19, Turner: 4, Maxim: 1.

While 37 are currently placed, we also have 10 apprentices who are actively participating but have not yet been offered job placement. Additionally, 13 apprentices are enrolled but are no longer participating in the program. As work opportunities arise, please keep these apprentices in mind. Their continued involvement is crucial to their success and the future of our union. Because employment for these apprentices is low, we have cancelled our application day in December and will reschedule in June, 2025. The apprentices need to get on the job and class hours completed. That being said, there is no sense in bringing in more if we cannot work the ones that we currently have.

Online Proctor Testing (OPT) Challenges and Updates

OPT has become a popular option among our members, allowing those without computers at home to test at our site. However, many members are facing challenges with the online testing process, resulting in more failures than passes. However, we had a week of testing occur after making a rough draft of this and 3 out of 4 members testing passed all of their tests that week. It seems as though members are waiting until the last minute resulting in added

pressure due to a close deadline. To clarify the differences:

- -OPT (Online Proctor Testing): You'll need to interact with an online proctor, move your camera around the room, and follow other specific protocols.
- -TCT (Test Center Testing): Conducted in a traditional test center with live proctors.
- -EOT (Event Online Testing): Takes place in one room with proctors from Proctor U observing multiple candidates.

Due to cost and the availability of unbiased proctors, our apprenticeship board has determined that OPT is the best fit for us. This option provides flexibility for members to take tests even if they lack the required technology at home. We strongly encourage all members to use the demo exam to familiarize themselves with the process before scheduling their test. Remember, we are not permitted to attend (be in the room) during the exam, and time slots are determined by the availability of an online proctor, not by us.

CCO and Certification Updates

We'd like to remind everyone that we do not have a lattice boom crane and haven't had one since 2019. Most of our members' lattice practical exams are taken at the ITEC Center in Crosby, TX, and we don't foresee a lattice boom crane returning to our location. We also conducted pilot testing for the Telehandler Certification now offered by CCO but have not moved forward with offering the actual testing. As OSHA prepares to update regulations related to powered industrial trucks (last revised between 1969 and 1971), we may see new credential requirements like those in the crane section. I still believe this will be a forklift certification if it does come and will not be the telehandler. We would really need telehandlers to get more popular with our contractors for that test to be entertained.

Davis-Bacon Certificates

We are now renewing and sending Davis-Bacon certificates to contractors every 90 days. This ensures our contractors can bid on

projects that require registered apprentices, supporting their ongoing success and compliance.

Instructor Training and Challenges with Delgado

Delgado Community College requires additional paperwork and training for our part-time instructors, Emile Rome and Leon Lemoine, who also work with our apprenticeship program. Balancing their hours between the two payrolls is a challenge, and we would greatly benefit from adding a full-time instructor to learn from them and help manage the workload.

Apprenticeship Maintenance and Sale

The union hall has generously offered to cover the costs of maintaining the grass behind the hall on Chef Menteur Hwy. This eliminates the need for us to handle this task while we await the sale of the apprenticeship property, which we hope to sell together with the union hall.

Career Fairs and Outreach

Due to our schedule of classes, meetings, practical testing, evaluations, OPT testing, and daily tasks, we haven't attended as many career fairs this year as we have in the past. While we regret missing these opportunities, we remain committed to finding new ways to engage with potential apprentices and promote our program.

Equipment Sales

We've successfully sold the John Deere Dozer on 7/18/24 for \$5,300 and the John Deere Road Grader on 8/29/24 for \$5,100 which is some of our older equipment.

These sales help us manage our assets effectively and ensure we have the resources needed for our continued program's success. Thank you to all our members, apprentices, instructors, union representatives and contractors for your hard work and dedication to our apprenticeship program. Let's continue to support each other and strive for excellence in everything we do. Please reach out if you have any questions or need assistance. Stay safe and keep up the great work!

Work is at full throttle

At the time of this writing,

work in the Southeast Louisiana (Baton Rouge Metro Area) has started ramping up with Turner Crane Rental manning four turnarounds and projects at Shell/Geismar, Shintech/Plaquemine, Oxy/Geismar and Westlake/Plaquemine with all jobs ranging from two to three weeks of work with probable work to follow.

Deep South Crane is presently in pre-turnaround at Delek/Krotz Springs with the actual turnaround starting around mid-October and lasting until late November.

As of now, I have been able to supply manpower for the current requests that have been sent in by these contractors, but will be limited soon as later requests arrive. So, I encourage anyone that may be seeking employment, and your credentials are up to date, to contact your district union hall and get on the out of work list so we can possibly keep everyone employed while work is plentiful.

Boh Brothers' positions are all presently filled as they continue working on the College Drive/Baton Rouge and the Comite Diversion Project in Zachary. I have been filling positions for operating engineers at River Bend Station for Day & Zimmerman and Allied Power for the FWST Project as stated in my last news article. The outages there are still scheduled to start sometime in

January 2025. Approximately 15 or more operators may be needed to fill these manpower requests.

After countless hours and quite a few meetings later, Local 406 has accepted and ratified another solid statewide two-year collective bargaining agreement with Turner Crane Rental that continues offering our fellow members fair and steady work opportunities. We have also sent out letters to Deep South to begin contract negotiations. In the near future, we will be meeting with stewards and members from all districts to discuss matters pertaining to the future CBA.

Local Business Manager D. Jason Billings and all business agents throughout the state have been doing our due diligence during contract negotiations trying to ratify another three-year contract agreement with CT Stevedor-

ing, Inc. This has been by far the hardest contract negotiation, with countless days and many hours due to implementing new language and contract clean up requested by the contractor and members as well. As we make progress during ratifications, I will keep the membership posted during our monthly union meetings and in my Engineers News report.

I would also like our 406 members to welcome our new Administrative Assistant, Christina Juneau, to the Baton Rouge office staff. She has been working tirelessly to accommodate and service our membership well as she brings new light and knowledge into our ever-changing work environment. So, if you are in the Baton Rouge area, please stop by to greet and introduce yourselves.

North Louisiana 406 Picnic a success

As we approach fall, the work has picked up. We now have B&N clearing working on the Price-Gregory job that is 126 miles of 42" pipeline here in Louisiana. The main line is going to start up shortly, however, it is dependent on how quickly the clearing moves. The process is always going to be a little slow starting up but should ramp up quickly as things move forward. We will be dispatching people as the contractor calls for operators. This is done according to the skills that you have listed, NOT by the number you are on the out-of-work list. Further, you must be able to perform the job you are dispatched for.

We have a new contractor (ICS) which Business Manager Jason Billings, and I signed to a local agreement just a few weeks ago. They are working in Coushatta, Louisiana at a sand classification plant (ARQ) and have taken three operators at this point and are building steel structures for the expansion that is ongoing. ICS was able to take this work from a non-union Contractor that was unable to perform the work in a suitable manner.

We are in the process of signing another contractor that has a yard in the southern part of the state. They are a sheet piling contractor that works as a signatory pipeline contractor through the PLCA agreement. Also, Wayne Holden is still working with a much smaller crew, but it is giving several of our operators jobs and feeding their families. The Paper Mill work is ongoing in West Monroe and should continue throughout the year.

Consider utilizing the training site in Crosby, TX to ensure you gain the skills and credentials to make yourself a better Operating Engineer. The training will help you become more efficient and skilled in your craft. This is necessary to stay the best in our industry, which I do believe that Local 406 has the best pipeliners and craftsmen

in the industry. I would like to thank the stewards and craftsmen for representing Local 406 so well. Your hard work and professionalism on these jobs are appreciated and it does not go unnoticed. Keep up the good work.

In closing, we enjoyed seeing everyone at the Pipeline Barbecue and Retiree's Picnic in north Louisiana in September. There was a lot of good food and fellowship. It was great to see some new faces and we missed the ones that were unable to make it this year. Hopefully, more of the membership will be able to attend the next one.




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Busy Fall Season ahead
